Carlisle Citadel Station sees the light of day again

In the refreshed West Coast livery, Virgin Trains Pendolino 390 040 enters a bright Carlisle station from the north on a sunny February 22nd 2018. The £14.5 million project to refurbish the roof structure, which dates from 1880, and replace 114 tons of glass – which was recycled locally - with 10512 m² of ETFE panels is all but complete and attention will soon turn to a further project to improve platform surfaces in the Grade 2* listed building.

Work on the roof has been ongoing for over two years and an innovative state-of-the-art scaffolding construction



was used to provide access to the roof for workers and a safe environment for passengers and railway operations below. Scaffolding used to span the 13 roof bays, 160 metres long and 47 metres wide weighed 1400 tonnes and had to be installed over and subsequently removed from the electrified lines underneath during five-hour overnight possessions by a team of advanced scaffolders from Palmers. Both installation and removal each took around nine months. Design consultants Arcadis, supported by architects Jefferson Sheard produced the designs for Network Rail's main contractors Galliford Try and both the local council and Historic England were consulted throughout, as were station operators Virgin Trains. 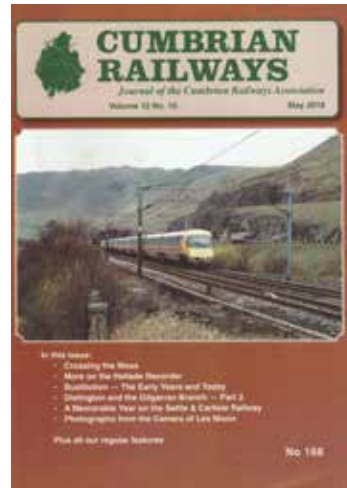

CRA Field Trip – Saturday 16th June 2018 – Piel (Roa Island) Branch

The CRA is organising a field trip on Saturday 16 June, along the historic trackbed of the Salthouse Junction- Piel Pier (Roa island) branch. The branch closed in 1936, with few railway structures remaining, although the stone approach to Piel Pier and the site of Rampside (Concle) station will be examined. The outing is being led by local railway author Howard Quayle. Why not join us?

The trip will start with a meet up in the car park, Barrow Town Hall at 10.30 hrs. Transport to Roa Island will be by minibus or large MPV (cost to be advised). We would hope to be back at Barrow Town Hall car park around 2.30pm.

Documentation (including plans) will be available, but not as hard-copy, being sent to participants by email prior to the outing.

The walking distance back from Roa Island is approx. 4 miles over generally firm ground, stout footwear and waterproof clothing is advised as there is no shelter on the walk. Coffee, teas, etc. can be purchased from the Bosun's Locker Cafe on Roa Island. Walkers should bring their own food.

Railway Museum honoured at National Heritage Awards Ceremony



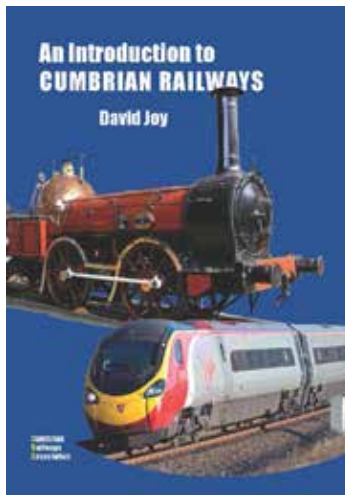
