# A Song For Edmondson – A Tyne Valley CRP Railway 200 Project

As one of Tyne Valley Community Rail Partnership's projects celebrating Railway 200 and future pioneers and careers in the rail industry, they have collaborated with singer songwriters, Gareth and Bronwen Davies-Jones, Hallbankgate Village School, and Lanercost CoE Primary School. Entitled "A Song for Edmondson," the project introduced the children to many new skills and experiences based on Brampton in Cumbria's railway heritage.

This culminated in the premiere on the 1<sup>st</sup> of July of new songs performed by children and teachers in the beautiful Lanercost Priory. CRA Chairman Philip Tuer and Publicity Officer Don Jary were delighted to be invited to the event.

Workshops in the weeks prior to the event helped the children write lyrics to songs featuring Brampton Railway Station and its stationmaster in 1836, Thomas Edmondson, the pioneer of railway ticketing, when the station was called Milton.

Many of the children were able to have the first experience of rail travel as they visited Haltwhistle to see the racks of Edmondson tickets in the Old Booking Hall and see how tickets were sold in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

### **Modelling Cumbrian Railways**

**Spreading our wings!** For the first time, the CRA will be represented at the Manchester Model Railway Exhibition on the 13<sup>th</sup> & 14<sup>th</sup> December. If you are going, please take the time to visit us on our stand. We will be delighted to see you and have a chat. It's always good to talk! We also expect to have on display models from our Shillcock/Pochin collection.

**Modelling Items**: These superb brass axle box and spring 4mm scale castings (below left) are suitable for a range of Cumbrian (and other railway) carriages. Price £8 per set of four

The Furness Railway squirrel seat kits are still available priced at £4 per pair in 4mm scale and £7 per pair in 7mm.

Below right is an image of both 4 and 7mm scale assembled seats. The etches for each set of ends need to be laminated together before adding the seat etch.



4mm Scale carriage springs in lost wax brass. These were used on 27' 6" under frames for both 1st, 2nd and 3rd class coaches on the Stockton and Darlington Railway and also the Cockermouth, Keswick and Penrith railway. They were



also fitted on the smoking saloons, composites, 2<sup>nd</sup> brakes and clerestory brakes. To make use of the springs modellers will also need the Saddle Ends, which are available from Prickly Pear Products. Cost - £5.00 for a set of four springs.

# Clifton bridge (West Coast Main Line) works compound

It shows Pendolino 390126 working 9M56 12.52 Edinburgh - Euston travelling south over the existing M6 bridge with the new metal bridge taking shape to the left with a couple of HGVs on the north bound M6. The new railway bridge is scheduled to be moved into place in January 2026.



### Naming of Locomotive 66791 "Settle and Carlisle 150"



The naming of GB Railfreight locomotive 66791 as "Settle and Carlisle 150" took place at Horton Quarry on 21st August 2025 – celebrating the start of freight services on the Settle – Carlisle line 150 years ago. The locomotive also carries a Settle & Carlisle line emblem. The unveiling was undertaken by Bryan Gray, Chair of the Settle & Carlisle Railway Trust and Becky Murphy, Regional Director North, Heidelberg Materials - the quarry operators. ### News From The South Tynedale Railway At Alston



As its contribution to the Railway 200 program of events, the railway ran 2 Gala weekends in July which featured a visiting locomotive as well as a number of the railway's own locomotives.

Hunslet 4-6-0 (Works Number 1215 of 1916) visited from the Apedale Valley Light Railway Staffordshire and, with the STR's own Green Dragon, "topped & tailed " all the services on each of the 4 days of the Gala (see photo above).

1215, one of 145 locomotives ordered by the government for the War Department Light Railways from Hunslet left the factory on 12th August 1916, immediately entering service in France. It was later restored following post-war service on Australian Sugar Cane railways and repatriation to the UK by the War Office Locomotive Trust in 2005.

Its most recent restoration was supported by a HLF grant resulting in a return to steam in 2018 at Apedale where it is currently based.

The STR's Polish built steam loco "Naklo" (Chrzanow Poland 1957) has been the subject of an extensive restoration which was completed in time for the locomotive to be in light steam at Alston during the gala and should be seen hauling service trains toward the end of the current operating season (See photo below).

# Ravenglass & Eskdale Railway Preservation Society Update



Having celebrated the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the R&ER at the railway's very successful Gala Weekend at the start of May, the R&ERPS has been supporting other anniversary events around the UK.

Firstly, R&ERPS-owned, 1966-built 2-8-2 steam locomotive *River Mite* paid a visit to the Talyllyn Railway (TR) in mid-Wales for their Awdry Extravaganza weekend in July. *Mite was* in the guise of *Mike*, one of the Isle of Sodor's 'small engines' from the fictitious Arlesdale Railway, created for his books by Rev. W. Awdry who based it on the R&ER. The gathering had been arranged to celebrate the eightieth anniversary of the first publication in 1945 of the first book in the Railway Series. *Mike* was hauled up and down the length of the TR on a flat wagon, delighting the child and adult attendees alike. Then, over the first weekend of August, the part-restored, part-rebuilt R&ERPS Trust loco Katie, which is usually on static display in the Ravenglass Railway Museum, was in steam at the Railway 200 event The Greatest Gathering at Litchurch Lane Works in Derby, working a short, temporary 15-inch gauge railway especially built for the weekend. This 0-4-0 tank engine had returned near to its birthplace as it was originally built by Sir Arthur Heywood in 1896 at his Duffield Bank Railway Workshops seven miles north of Derby (for the Duke of Westminster's Eaton Railway at his Eaton Hall Estate outside Chester). After a spell at Ravenglass (1916-1919) in the early days of 15-inch gauge operation, the loco moved to Southport, then to Fairbourne where it was withdrawn and dismantled. Eventually its frames were passed on to the Narrow Gauge Museum at Tywyn before they arrived back at Ravenglass under the curatorship of the R&ERPS Trust who funded its restoration. Plans are underway to celebrate next year the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the start of passenger services on the R&ER in 1876. Next year also marks the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary since the introduction into traffic of the Ravenglass-built 2-6-2 *Northern Rock*. Further details of these celebrations will follow in due course.

You'll have been thinking things have gone quiet regarding new CRA publications over the last couple of years but in the background, like the proverbial swan, the team has been working hard.


We are working hard on "The Cleator and Workington Junction Railway" book, preparing it for printing. This will prove to be a definitive work, thanks to author Dave Richardson.

# Furness Railway Locomotive No. 20 – The Story So Far

Britain's oldest working steam locomotive gets a new biography!



A new book celebrating Britain's oldest working steam locomotive - and film star celebrity - has been launched at an event in Cumbria, at a station it used to serve. Furness Railway Locomotive No. 20 - The Story So Far has been written by Tim Owen, who chairs the Furness Railway Trust which has published the book. Appropriately, the launch took place at an original Furness Railway station - Kents Bank – where the locomotive, built in Manchester in 1863, would have frequently passed through.

The book tells the story of the locomotive from its early years operating mostly goods traffic on the Furness Railway in the Barrow area.

Eventually, No. 20 was retired. It was donated to a children's playground at George Hastwell School, Barrow, where for over twenty years local children enjoyed playing on the engine, pretending to be drivers!


What happened next is the most fascinating part of the story. A small group of local enthusiasts got together to restore the locomotive to working order. In 1990 the Lakeside Railway Society purchased the locomotive, and the following year was passed on to the newly formed Furness Railway Trust. With help from what was then Vickers Shipyard (VSEL) the locomotive was restored to its original condition and first steamed in 1999.

Since then, the locomotive has operated at dozens of heritage railways around Britain and has starred in two major feature films.

# The Kendal & Windermere Railway by Dick Smith

To coincide with the 175th Anniversary of the completion of the line from Oxenholme to Windermere, Dick Smith has

written a second and much enlarged edition of his original book telling the history of the Kendal and Windermere Railway. This second edition includes a new introductory chapter: 'The world the Railway changed', and two other new chapters. One deals with the succession of proposals to extend the railway beyond its present terminus at Windermere, the other looks at the railway connections with Cropper's paper mills in the Burneside area. The book is richly illustrated using photos from the CRA and other archives as well as the usual high-quality maps. The photographs, several not published before, show many of the different types of traction and the variety of liveries seen on the branch over the years. The book also includes specially drawn detailed signalling diagrams of the Windermere branch in the years before it was reduced to a single track.
